Naglis Kardelis, PhD, Chief Researcher at the Department of Contemporary Philosophy (Lithuanian Culture Research Institute) and a professor at the Vilnius University Faculty of Philosophy. He has authored two books – Vienovės įžvalga Platono filosofijoje (The Insight of Unity in Plato's Philosophy, 2007, in Lithuanian) and Pažinti ar suprasti? Humanistikos ir gamtotyros akiračiai (To Know or to Understand? The Horizons of Humanities and Natural Sciences, 2008, in Lithuanian). Kardelis mainly focuses on the reception and actualization of classical Greek philosophy in contemporary philosophy, on the philosophy of archaeology, and on the scholarly legacy of Arvydas Šliogeris and Marija Gimbutas. He is currently working on a book dedicated to the philosophical evaluation of Gimbutas' archaeomythological reconstructions.

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James Lovelock was an English independent scientist, environmentalist and futurist. He is best known for proposing the Gaia hypothesis, which postulates that the Earth functions as a self-regulating system. Lovelock was also the inventor of several chemical-detecting devices, including the electron-capture detector (ECD). His books include: Gaia: A New Look at Life on Earth (1979); The Ages of Gaia (1988); Gaia: The Practical Science of Planetary Medicine (1991); Homage to Gaia (2000), The Vanishing Face of Gaia: A Final Warning (2009).

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Mikhail Shishkin, Russian-Swiss novelist and essayist, one of the leading figures of Russian intellectual dissent and a contemporary Russian literary figure who is the only author to win all three major Russian literary prizes (including the Russian Booker Prize). He is a long-standing and outspoken critic of the Putin regime whose essays have been published in The New York Times, Wall Street Journal, The Guardian, Le Monde, and elsewhere. His works of fiction include, most notably The Taking of Izmail (1999); Maidenbair (2005); Letterbook (2010).

Irena Vaišvilaitė is a Lithuanian art historian and diplomat who served as Lithuania's ambassador to the Holy See and later Permanent Representative to the United Nations Education, Scientific and Cultural Organization.
